
At its Annual Awards Night on May 15, Columbia Lodge No. 25 recognized Brothers with Incremental Service Pins and for excellence and unselfish service.



Presentation of Community Service Award to Robert J. Zanlungo, Jr.

The Emerson C. Reed Award for Excellence is presented to a brother who has demonstrated excellence in some significant field of endeavor for the benefit of the Lodge. It is named after the late Brother Emerson C. Reed who set an example of excellence in all that he undertook in the field of Masonry. This year the award was presented to Worshipful Brother Brian Berk.

The Daskam-Nott Award is presented to a brother who has demonstrated outstanding and unselfish service to Columbia Lodge or Masonry in general for an extended period of years. It is named in honor of Brother George F. Daskam who was Grand Master when Daskam Lodge No. 86 was chartered in 1858, and Brother John Nott who was the first Worshipful Master of Columbia Lodge No. 25 when it was chartered in 1793. This year the award was presented to Brother Santi Ranno.

The Community Service Award for 2019 was presented to Mr. Robert J. Zanlungo, Jr. on behalf of the community of Glastonbury. There are many community needs that are not met within the budget of the town government. Volunteers sometimes fill these needs. There are a few men and women who devote an extraordinary amount of their time, talents and other resources in this effort.

Our Brother in the West

Tony's Masonic journey began in 1977 when he received light through the three Masonic degrees, culminating with being raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on June 22, 1977 in St. Johns' #4 in Hartford, Connecticut. He

immediately immersed himself in the work of the Lodge, jumping quickly to Senior Steward, Senior Deacon, plus Junior and Senior Warden before being elected to Worshipful Master for 1982.

He further expanded his Masonic activity by also affiliating with Daskam Lodge #86, where he became a close friend of brother Gerald Thompson and served as Associate Grand Marshal for him as Gerry began his term as Right Worshipful Deputy of District 6C on March 31, 1993.

He later served as Deputy for District 6A from 2009 to 2011. Many of his fondest and most memorable moments of Tony occurred as he advanced through the chairs at Scottish Rite, where he was doing it all, as he always does: officer, directing degrees as needed, and best of all, performing on stage. When a serious vacancy occurred in the Lodge of Perfection. Tony volunteered and jumped right into the position of Senior Warden. Tony's total dedication to all things Masonic earned him the honor of being coroneted an honorary 33rd degree Sovereign Grand Inspector General in St Louis, Missouri on September 23, 2003. He currently serves as Treasurer of the Valley of Hartford Scottish Rite Newington, in Connecticut.
