Historian Corner

The Morgan Affair - gone but not forgotten. William Morgan (1774–1826?) was a resident of Batavia, New York, whose



disappearance and presumed murder in 1826 ianited powerful against the movement Freemasons. a fraternal society that had become influential in the United After Morgan States. announced his intention to publish a book exposing Freemasonry's secrets, he was arrested on trumped-up

charges. He disappeared soon after, and was believed to have been kidnapped and killed by Masons from western New York. The incident precipitated a widespread anti-Masonic movement that for the decade of the 1930's caused a dramatic decline in the membership and activities of the fraternity in America.

On September 13, 1882, the National Christian Association, a group opposed to secret societies, commissioned and erected a statue in memoriam to William Morgan in the Batavia Cemetery. The ceremony was witnessed by 1,000 people, including representatives from local Masonic lodges.

The monument reads:

"Sacred to the memory of Wm. Morgan, a native of Virginia, a Capt. in the War of 1812, a respectable citizen of Batavia, and a martyr to the freedom of writing, printing and speaking the truth. He was abducted from near this spot in the year 1826, by Freemasons and murdered for revealing the secrets of their order. The court records of Genesee County and the files of the Batavia Advocate, kept in the Recorders office contain the history of the events that caused the erection of this monument."
