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Historian Corner



Getting the Third Degree

'Getting the Third Degree' is an expression associated with interrogation techniques.

Getting the Third Degree as expression that has been around since at

least the early 1500's. One of the first known uses of it was in D. Rembert Dodoens book Niewe herball or historie of plantes. In 1602 it appears in Shakespeare's Twelfth Night. In both cases it refers to the level of moisture or dryness, as well as heat and cold.

Using degrees to describe things was commonplace in the middle-ages. Although the original guild lodges were around at the time Dodoens and Shakespeare were writing their respective works, there does not seem to be any direct correlation between the masonic guilds and the expression.

Flashing forward to the early 20th century the expression 'Getting the Third Degree' began to appear in crime novels. The meaning changed from the middle-ages definition to a series of unrelenting questions trying to gain information from a witness or criminal.

The more modern definition is directly tied to Freemasonry and has, at times, been specifically cited as the origin of the phrase.

From the early guild lodges, Freemasonry has been a place where information was meant to be exchanged. In the guild lodges, it was a place where education took place. It was often the only educational opportunity individuals had if they were not members of the clergy or royalty. To advance to the next degree was to get better wages and more responsibility. It also meant to be able to travel and work in other cities and countries. This required the apprentice and the journeyman (Fellowcraft in Masonry) to be able to answer questions about mathematics and other skills in order to be advanced.

During the age of Enlightenment, when the Freemasonry we know today took shape, it was a place for the free exchange of ideas and information. Often these ideas and information were outlawed or considered heresy. At masonic gatherings questions were asked and answers given regarding a wide range of topics. Some of the questions ensured those hearing those heretical ideas were trustworthy. More especially it tested the knowledge of new initiates confirming they had a suitable understanding of the order. This was even more essential in the places where there were "mouth to ear" lodges.

"Mouth to Ear" means there are no written ritual books.

All of the lessons of Freemasonry are taught from a more knowledgeable member of the fraternity to a newer member. The idea of this intensive question and answer narrative was adopted by individuals writing crime fiction in the early 1900's and made its way into popular slang.

Necrology



Sadly, in the past few months, four of our brothers have been called to the Grand Lodge on High.

Brother Leonard H. Barker passed

away on Saturday February 18, 2023. He was born in Hartford, CT on August 19, 1931. Len was raised in Daskam #86 in 1960. He graduated from East Hartford High School in the class of 1949. He served in the US Navy and worked at Pratt & Whitney Aircraft. Later he worked with his father, owner of Barker's Oil Services. After his father's death, he ran the company until he retired, and his daughter and son-in-law took over.

Worshipful Brother Paul F. Blake passed away on Wednesday February 8, 2023. Paul was born in Boston, MA on March 30, 1942. Paul was raised in Columbia #25 in 1965. He served as Master of this Lodge in 1999 and 2003. Paul was a leader through his excellence in ritual and his dedication to helping younger brothers as they acquired the skills required for advancing through the officer ranks.

Paul graduated from Glastonbury High School in 1961. He went to work for Pratt & Whitney directly after graduation, starting as a machine operator. Through the course of the next 34 years, he progressed to the position of Systems Analyst. Following this he worked for Rem Sales and then for Sinco, a company that produces and sells safety netting.

During the Cold War Cuban Crisis in the 1950's, Paul and his parents were members of the Ground Observer Corps, watching for and helping to track aircraft that might be a threat to the U.S. More down to earth, Paul had an interest in railroading and model trains, photography and traveling.

Worshipful Brother Mario L. Accornero passed away on Sunday January 22. 2023. He was born in New York, NY on November 23, 1926. Mario was raised in Columbia #25 in 1951. He lived in South Glastonbury from age 6. Mario attended Glastonbury schools, graduating from Glastonbury High School in 1944. The demands of farming then required Mario to work full-time on the farm, which he did for the rest of his working life. He owned and operated Accornero Orchards in South Glastonbury.

He was a member of the Glastonbury Fire Department from 1947, rising to the rank of Chief in 1988. Upon retirement, he was named Chief Emeritus and remained active until age 85. Within the community, Mario served on the Welfare Board for the Town of Glastonbury from 1956 to 1968. He also served on the town's Farm Preservation Committee.

Mario became a member of the Hartford Regional Marketing Authority in 1962, including service in the capacity of Vice President. He was also a member of the Hartford County Soil and Water Conservation, serving as Chairman for 15 years. Mario was awarded "Outstanding Contribution in Conservation



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
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of Soil, Water and Related Resources" in 1979. He was a life member of the Connecticut Pomological Society and was the recipient of the "Award of Distinction" in 1986. Mario was also a member of the Farm Bureau, where he served as a member of the Membership, Legislation and Taxation Committees. As a fruit grower, he was chosen "Outstanding Farmer of Connecticut" in 1960 by the Connecticut Jaycees. Tuscan Lodge No. 17, F. & A. M., Prince Hall Affiliates also presented him with an Award for his contributions in the form of fruit baskets for needy families. He was also a life-long member of Glastonbury Grange No. 26.

Mario and served as Master of Columbia Lodge No. 25 A.F. & A.M. in 1958 and 1995 and served as the President of the Lodge Building Association for many years. He chaired the construction of the lodge building expansion in 2002 following the consolidation with Orient Lodge No. 62. In 1991 he received the Pierpont Edwards Award in Bronze from the Grand Lodge of CT.

Right Worshipful Brother Robert G. Fitzgerald passed



away on Saturday January 14. 2023. He was born on April 16, 1935 in Northampton, MA. Bob was raised in Orient#62 in 1974. Bob was a Cub Scout and Boy Scout. eventually attaining the coveted

rank of Eagle Scout. At Amherst High School he was a swimmer, football player, and trombonist. His high school yearbook noted his class recognizing him as "Punster Funster" and anyone knowing Bob fondly recalls his lifelong love for all types of puzzles, brain teasers, verbal puns, and for his quirky smile (the result of a high school ear injury/surgery mishap) as well as his "corny" sense of humor.

After graduating from Amherst High, he attended the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. completing a BS in Chemical Engineering. While there, he met and married a coed studying French Literature, Nancy Jean Campbell. They were married 53 years until her passing in 2010. They have five children and one foster son.

Following university, Bob took a position with the Factory Insurance Association (now Industrial Risk Insurers.) Initially assigned to the Philadelphia area, the growing family moved first to Harrisburg, PA and then to Buffalo, NY, before finally settling down in East Hartford when Bob was assigned to "Home Office" company headquarters in Hartford (1964). Bob retired from IRI in 1998 as Vice President of Special Risk Underwriting, after 40 years of company service.

As a long-time member of South Congregational Church (East Hartford), Bob sang in the choir for decades. He was twiceelected Moderator of the Church. He was Assistant Church Treasurer, Choir Treasurer, served multiple terms on Board of Deacons, and sat on or chaired the Board of Stewardship & Enlistment.

Bob was also a nationally ranked cribbage player and regular on the tournament circuit. He was a "Life Master" in the American Cribbage Congress (the international organization of serious-"It's not a matter of life or death: it's way more important than that!"-players).

Bob was very active in Freemasonry. He capped off decades of dedicated service when he was chosen to serve as Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut from 2004 to 2016. Upon stepping down he was elected Grand Secretary Emeritus, In 2021, Bob received the General Grand Chapter Distinguished Service Medal in Bronze. The Grand Lodge recognized Bob's many contributions to the Craft by awarding him the Pierpont Edwards Medal in Bronze on April 5, 2000. He was a long-standing member and Secretary of Orient Lodge No. 62 A. F. & A. M. (East Hartford). He was elected Worshipful Master (1979). He also was a member of or held various offices or honors with these organizations: East Side Past Masters' Association; York Rite Masonic Bodies; Pythagoras Chapter No. 17, Royal Arch Masons; Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons; Wolcott Council No. 1, Royal & Select Masters; Washington Commandry No. 1. Knights Templar: Valley of Hartford, A.A.S.R; Sphinx Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S; and Nutmeg Forest No. 116, Tall Cedars of Lebanon.
