Necrology



Sadly, in the past few months, two of our brothers have been called to the Grand Lodge on High.

Brother Charles W. Marshall

passed away on Monday May 7, 2024. Brother Charles was born July 26, 1933 in Cleveland, Ohio. He grew up in Albion, Pennsylvania, where he graduated from Albion Area High School in the class of 1952. In November of that year, during the Korean War, he joined the U.S. Navy. He served aboard the Aircraft Carrier U.S.S Carol Sea. He later attended Submarine School in Groton, Connecticut and served aboard the U.S.S. Sea Robin # 407. He was discharged from the Navy on November 5, 1956 and reported for work at the Connecticut Power Company in Manchester, Connecticut the following day. He worked in the Line Department for 35 years, and after two mergers he retired from the Connecticut Light & He lived in the Power Company in 1991. Manchester/Vernon area since 1956, and wintered in Venice, Florida for ten years.

Charles sought light in Masonry and was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on April 18, 1962 in Orient Lodge No. 62, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, with Worshipful Brother Alexander W. Grimshaw presiding Master, and has been a true and faithful Brother since then. He became a member of Columbia Lodge No. 25 when the two lodges consolidated in 2006. He was a member of the Craft for 62 years.

Brother Gerald F. Thompson passed away on Wednesday July 24, 2024. Gerry was born July 15, 1928, in Hartford to the late Lester Gordon and Elsie (Franklin) Thompson. He met Betty Thompson (same last name!) in high school and they were married for 71 years. They were blessed with two children, Daine and Stacey, along with four grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Gerry was a Korean War U.S. Army veteran and a graduate of the University of Connecticut. He spent his career as a civil engineer for Northeast Utilities, retiring in 1993.

Gerry was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on January 11, 1984 in Daskam Lodge #86 (now Columbia #25), with Worshipful Brother George N. Seely presiding Master, and has been a true and faithful Brother since then. He was a member of the Craft for over 40 years. Gerry served as Worshipful Master of Daskam #86 in 1989. He also served as Chaplain for 19 years. Gerry served the Grand Lodge as District Deputy of Masonic District 6B in 1994 and 1995. In 2002 Gerry received the Pierpont Edwards Award in Bronze for Distinguished Masonic Service. Gerry was

also a member of the Scottish Rite and served as Most Wise Master of the Cyrus Goodell Chapter of Rose Croix in 2000-2001. In 2004 Gerry was Coroneted a 33rd Degree Scottish Rite Mason in Minneapolis. He was a member of Good Intent Chapter #17, serving as Worthy Patron numerous times. He was an active member in his church, New Covenant United Methodist Church (formerly Burnside United Methodist Church).
