From the Secretary's Desk

When I was going through my degrees and as I worked my way up the chairs, I did most of my memorization work while walking my dog, Fang. This was a form of multi-tasking that worked well for me because the tasks of reading, reciting, and memorizing were purely mental, while walking was purely physical; both could be done effectively at the same time. As I think about it, I was getting a third

task out of the way, in that Fang needed to get outside twice a day no matter what.

I found that the length of our walks depended on what I was working on. The 1st section lectures were learned during our morning constitutionals of a half hour or so. The Middle Chamber of the Fellowcraft Degree called for progressively longer hikes in the evening as I got through more and more of its various parts. Eventually, I needed a route of at least 2 miles in order to have enough time to go through that from start to finish, requiring a decidedly leisure pace. Fang didn't seem to mind that I was constantly mumbling while on these treks; he was thoroughly occupied in his own doggy business, and he never divulged any of the "secrets" which he heard over and over again (at least as far as I know).

Fang died when I was Junior Warden. I (and possibly he) had just learned the ritual associated with presiding in the East for opening and closing the Lodge and the Entered Apprentice Degree. I had a harder time with the Fellowcraft and Master Mason Degree work as Master, not so much because they are more extensive, but because I abandoned my memorization scheme.

I still walk regularly, a couple of miles every time, usually while listening to music. I also still have memorization work to do, mostly for my appendant body activities. It's become harder for me than I remember, which I attributed to nothing more than getting older.

Today, as I was working through a particularly long part for an upcoming Royal Arch Degree in my easy chair, I found that the words and phrases just weren't sticking the way they should, and I was getting anxious about it. Deciding that I needed to burn some energy, I got dressed and before leaving, decided to take my ritual book with me instead of my earphones.

The old formula worked again for me – keeping my body moving helped my mind absorb the difficult language of the ritual just as it used to, and by the time I got home, I had run through the whole thing without reference to the book. I really feel like I accomplished something good this afternoon, even if it did take 6 ½ miles to get it done. While I don't know that Fang would be proud, I know he'd be tired.
